# A YEAR LIKE NO OTHER

It's been said that adversity often brings out the best in us. Amidst a transition to in-house fiscal and human resources functions and a global pandemic – Michigan Works! Southeast found itself on the front lines of the worst economic crisis since the Great Depression. Despite these challenges, our team stepped up to meet the needs of our region and connect our community to a better future!

In merely weeks, our unemployment rate soared from about 3% to 23.42% as entire industries temporarily closed down due to the pandemic. More people applied for unemployment insurance in one month than in the entirety of the Great Recession of 2009-2010! Our team stepped up\*\* to help the Unemployment Insurance Agency work through their backlog, receiving over 40,000+ calls and resolving over 1,000+ claims between March and December.

Our team rapidly transformed the way we work with most staff working from home and altering our centers to ensure the safety of our team and customers. Nevertheless, our team continued to provide top tier customer service and found new ways to connect our community to a better future! Our centers adopted an appointment-based model to serve people safely. Meanwhile, a live chat feature was implemented on our website, allowing customers to speak to a knowledgeable team member form the safety of their home. Workshops and job fairs were made virtual, with the State of Michigan's Brazen Platform used to connect employers to the qualified talent they need.

These are challenging times, but we believe in helping those in need and will always be creating connections to a better future!



# 2019 - 2020 FINANCIALS\*



Life isn't always going to be composed of glitter (sunshine) or gold (rainbows). Life is filled with everyday struggles, hardships, and setbacks. Everyone struggles in life, but it's what you choose to do with your struggles that will define who

Have you ever struggled in life? I know I have.

Everything in my life was going great; I worked two jobs, had money in the bank, a vehicle, and a roof over my head. As some would say, "I was living a good life." What could possibly go wrong? In Feb 2019, I lost one of my jobs which was my main source of income due to downsizing. I was laid off indefinitely.

Once unemployed, I started to fill out applications for every and any job, qualified or not, only to get turned down. I was thinking to myself, with my management experience and BBA/ACC degree this should not be happening! Days turned into weeks; weeks turned into months. This is when my world started to crash right before me.

My money was running low, I was on the verge of losing my vehicle doorstep—how low could I go.... As a single parent I did what no one would want to do: I swallowed my pride and filed for government assistance. The little cash assistance and food stamps that I was receiving helped but it was not enough to survive on. I needed a life line and I needed it now!

Through it all my dad was there for me and mostly for my daughter.

of the requirements assistance is that you have to look for a job and register with Michigan Works. In April 2019 I met Pam Rhodes and Shannon Pettry. I told them what I wanted and needed to accomplish my goals and they listened. I signed up for every workshop class that was suggested to be beneficial to me in the long run. After countless resumes having been sent out and still no good news, they too realized I was having difficulties getting a job in the Accounting field because I lacked the experience that was required. So, Pam decided it would be best to set me up with on-the-job training with a local employer: America's Preferred Home Warranty.

On June 3rd, 2019 I was hired as an A/R Clerk in the Accounting Department. I celebrated my one year anniversary on June 3rd, 2020. On Oct 22nd, I was promoted to A/P Clerk. I can honestly say that if it weren't for Michigan Works, Pam Rhodes, and Shannon Pettry, I would not be where I am today. This organization has opened many doors for me and I am very thankful to them.

No matter how much it hurts, struggles only last for a certain period of time. You just have to believe that it'll get better and you're not alone in your struggles. There's someone out there whose strugales are worse than yours. A good life is a life of struggles. What won't kill you will make you stronger.

## **LOCAL IMPACT**

Summer '20 was set to be the biggest year for our Summer Youth Employment Program. The program expanded into all five counties and rebranded as #MISummer Internship (and Summer Works in Washtenaw County). Applications opened in March and saw more employers and students apply than ever before - then the world changed.


The COVID-19 Pandemic forced us to change how we work and learn as we sheltered at home. #MISummerInternship was no longer possible in its original form and it seemed like the program would have to be halted until life could return to normal. This program is too important, however, and our team refused to let COVID prevent our youth from gaining critical employment skills!

Our team partnered with Jobs for Michigan's Graduates to create the "Virtual Internship Prep Course": a three-week professional development course in which youth could learn essential skills and develop their portfolio from the safety of their home. Like #MISummerInternship, participants earned while they learned – receiving up to \$1,000 for successfully completing the program.

The Virtual Internship Prep Course was a resounding success, with 95 Students completing the three-week program!

## **LOCAL IMPACT**

HILLSDALE

Our Hillsdale team equipped county youth for employment by providing training sessions and professional portfolio workshops. In addition, our team provided adult education services to Hillsdale residents, promoting greater business stability throughout the county.

**JACKSON** 

The Summer Youth Employment Program, now called #MISummerInternship, continued in Jackson County with 29 youth and 13 employers. Major local employers such as Power Drive Systems, Jackson County Parks, and the Jackson District Library all hired their interns part time after the season ended.

**IENAWEE** 

Michigan Rehabilitation Services awarded our Lenawee team with the Community Partner Champion Award, recognizing their commitment to serving individuals with disabilities. The team's collaborative approach to offering individualized services to meet employment and training goals - along with a strong and successful partnership between the two agencies - were the standout reasons for our Lenawee team's statewide recognition.

**LIVINGSTON** 

Our Livingston team rose to the recent challenge of COVID-19 and answered non-stop phone calls helping folks with their unemployment. They also successfully transitioned to working from home every other day to lessen the risk of COVID exposure while still giving customers excellent service.

WASHTFNAW

The 3rd Annual Expungement Fair in Washtenaw County was held virtually and saw attendance double from the previous year. The free webinar featured Senator Jeff Irwin, who discussed new legislation that could create more opportunities for expungements.
